It always seems like getting from Thanksgiving to Christmas is a blur. The secular world doesn't help. Christmas decorations are up before Halloween. As we look forward to the new year, perhaps we are able to slow down just a little. It used to be there was a big deal about making resolutions. I haven't done that for a long time. I think if I really want to make a change in my life I can do that at any time of the year. There are times to contemplate what is going well for you, for those you love and for the world, and the new year may be just the time to do that. It may be the time to be prayerful as well. The world continues to meet differences with violence, here in America and far from us in other countries. I believe we often have heavy hearts when we hear or read about war, school shootings and murders within our own little piece of the world we know as Western New York. Yesterday (I'm preparing this on December 17) was the school shooting in Madison, Wisconsin. As the reporters were reflecting on what happened, one shared that it was a 2<sup>nd</sup> grader who called 911 to report the shooting in her school. What a responsibility that a 7 year old (I think that should be a 2<sup>nd</sup> graders age) took on to call for emergency help. Many of us will say: "That just shouldn't be what 7 year olds are expected to know how to do." Yet, it probably saved many lives or more injuries, at the least.

We are entering into the Epiphany season in the church, always on January 6th. It is that time when we celebrate the kings arriving to visit the baby Jesus, by following the brightness of the star. This is the time to recognize the blessings that come to us through the light that touches our souls and gives us a new desire to celebrate Jesus. That becomes our focus all the way through February. Our Annual Meeting will be on February 2, following lunch. I hope you experience the light here at St. Peter's, as we move into the New Year and through Epiphany, by worshipping with us, following us on Facebook and reaching out to each other with the love we know we have for one another.

that many recognize when we have put together school kits, medical kits or clean up kits, to give to areas of the world where there has been a tragedy. If you ever watch the news when there are hurricanes or massive storms and people are housed in stadiums or school gymnasiums, there are often gray or blue blankets on the cots that are set up. They are provided by Church World Service, one of the many ways they provide care for those affected by tragedy. Other churches I have served have been very involved with this ministry. It's base is in Maryland, not far from the church I served in PA. There were groups from a number of UCC churches that would travel there to package all the kits that would come in. I want to share a brief history of CWS with you from Rebekah Belase. "CWS" is soon to celebrate it's 80th anniversary, and its vision of building a world where everyone has enough: enough food, enough of a voice, and a safe place to call home. Our success has been built on partnerships with local churches and grassroots advocacy. During COVID, we started seeing people deciding to leave ministry at higher rates. How can CWS partner with local faith communities if our own faith leaders are tired and burned out? We are now in the second year of this pilot program to provide ecumenical support and resources to improve self-care and build resilience for our clergy."

I will be having several opportunities to learn and grow and to restore and renew my faith and my ministry through this program titled: "Restore and Renew". It will include Zoom meetings, retreats and counseling

throughout the entire year of 2025. It has three groups that includes clergy serving churches, some getting a life coach, some in a more intense therapeutic settings and some who are judicatories(association and conference staff) and the research company, Barna, who will be following the program throughout the entire year. I will be with other colleagues who have also been accepted into this program, after the first zoom, knowing that I have never met any of these people. It is viewed as a Continuing Education program for clergy from a variety of denominations participating throughout the U.S. I am excited about this and anticipate that I will be a better pastor as I participate through it, let alone more restored and renewed. I will be away for this three different times, the first is from January 19-25 and then April 21-25. There will be someone on-call for me during these times as I will be out of state for all of the retreats. Our church council has approved this as a continuing education program, knowing that I will bring back to St. Peter's, the results of taking part of this. I have not done any continuing education programs for more than a day, while at the New York Conference meetings and am thankful to have this privilege.

We appreciate the hard work our talented musicians put in to bring us such joyous and uplifting music.

Don't forget to sign up to bring Altar Flowers. Happy New Year! As I write this, I fondly look back at 2024 as a year filled with purpose and giving, and look ahead to a bright future of mission work at St. Peter's in 2025. I will be working on the benevolence distribution list soon, and will prepare a full report for the upcoming annual meeting in February. I have another piece in this newsletter about our impressive holiday giving accomplishments, but want to again say a huge THANK YOU to everyone for the love in their hearts which you choose to share so freely!

#### SIERRA LEONE/JERICHO ROAD GLOBAL OUTREACH:

Phebian Abdulai continues her medical mission at the Adama Martha Memorial Community Health Center in Sierra Leone. Thank you for supporting this life-transforming work by donating money through the bimonthly envelopes and gently-used clothing to the clothing shed. #### PLYMOUTH CROSSROADS:

St. Peter's provided Thanksgiving food and Christmas joy to Plymouth Crossroads as part of our sharing season. Legislator



Lindsay Lorigo also visited Plymouth recently, and wrote on her Facebook page: "Plymouth Crossroads is a wonderful voluntary program serving at-risk youth ages 16-20 to help transition them from instability to the next independent steps in their lives. I had the pleasure of meeting Jennifer McAndrew, Plymouth Crossroads' Executive Director, to learn about their story and tour the expansive home in West Seneca. Since 2011, Plymouth Crossroads has been providing a bright future for children who may not have anywhere else to go. I am honored to work with such a great program in my district! **CLOTHING SHED:** The clothing shed collects and redistributes gently-used clothing to organizations and people all over the world, and it continues to receive a great deal of donations every week. We use funds raised to support Phebian Abdulai's work in Sierra Leone. **DO NOT** put any household items, pillows, electronics, toys or books in the shed!

**FOOD PANTRY:** The food pantry helps address emergency food insecurity issues in our church or community, and also filled in some additional needs for the Thanksgiving dinners. Please put any donations in the barrel in the glass vestibule during church office hours, or contact Kathy Reandeau for a pick-up. Please contact me if you know of anyone in need of food.

**NY/HELP HONDURAS:** Since 1989, NY/HELP Honduras has been working with the indigenous people of La Laguna and surrounding communities to help them empower and improve their lives in these remote mountain communities. After 30 years of trips to Honduras once or twice a year, COVID stopped them cold. From 2020 - 2023, NY/HELP was unable to visit the village of La Laguna or the other villages where projects had been started. However, due to much better communications than when this mission project first started in 1989, the work did proceed.

The first trip back to Honduras was in March 2023. This trip's purpose was primarily to check in, see how the



people were doing, and get an update on the progress of each of the projects – the medical clinic, school supplies, sewing academy, and

middle school construction. The second return trip took place from September 10-17, 2024. A highlight was the all-encompassing Mobile Medical Clinic held in Mescales. Doctors dealt with basic medical needs, nurses gave immunizations, and dental professionals pulled teeth.

The building of the new middle school for 7th to 9th grades for children living farther from La Laguna in the "lower villages" is progressing. Four classrooms are complete. Eventually, the school will have six rooms: one for each grade level, a library, an office, and a space the use of which will be determined by the needs of the local people. #### Butternut Squash Soup (Vegan, Dairy-free)

Dive into a bowl of easy, 6-ingredeient Butternut Squash Soup. Made dairy-free and Whole30-approved, this dish is a great healthy dinner option and comes together in less than 30 minutes.

Prep: 10 Cook: 20 Total: 30 minutes Yield 8 servings

Ingredients:

- 4 tbsp olive oil
- 2 small white onion, diced
- 4 tsp minced garlic
- 2 tsp salt
- 1 tsp pepper
- 12 heaping cups butternut squash, peeled and cubed
- 8 cup vegetable broth
- Optional: yogurt + thyme for garnish

Instructions:

- 1. In a large saucepan, heat oil over medium heat.
- Add onion and garlic, let sauté for a few minutes. Add in salt and pepper.
- 3. Add in butternut squash and stock, then cover and bring to a boil.
- 4. Once boiling, crack lid and let simmer for 15 minutes or until butternut squash is fork tender.
- 5. Using a vitamix or a hand blender, blend until completely smooth.
- 6. Top with optional yogurt and thyme.

"What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if someone claims to have faith but has no deeds? Can such faith save them? Suppose a brother or a sister is without clothes and daily food. If one of you says to them, "Go in peace; keep warm and well fed," but does nothing about their physical needs, what good is it? In the same way, faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action, is dead. But someone will say, "You have faith; I have deeds." Show me your faith without deeds, and I will show you my faith by my deeds." (James 2:14-18)

I have often said that St. Peter's is small, but mighty, and that point is always driven home when we are asked to show our faith by our deeds. We may not be many, but the response I receive when I put out a need is always instant and impressive.



Our "little group" was able to feed almost 40 people for Thanksgiving (not including leftovers!). Some of that was in the form of freshly-prepared food that we took over to Plymouth

Crossroads, while the rest was deliveries that included everything needed to make a full Thanksgiving dinner. Just when I thought everything had been distributed, I received a call asking if we might be able to provide a Christmas meal for a family in need. Thinking that we had little to offer, God stepped in and I received news that somebody had a turkey available that they were not able to bring in for Thanksgiving – definitely moving in mysterious ways, I'd say. So, we will be able to provide that meal, and the giving keeps on going.

For Christmas we put almost 100 tags on the Giving Tree (and thank you to the special angel who helps me with those!). Then we didn't have worship service one week, and then we had mountains of snow. I was beginning to think it would be a bare bones Christmas this year, but I should know better than that! These are just a few of the packages that poured in. Thank you to the special shoppers who went above and beyond, to those who helped me carry everything to my car, to Page 1 for their support, and to all of you at St. Peter's who go out of

your way to show your faith in action!

Mark started playing the guitar at the age of 6 and the trombone in 4th grade. His dad was an Army band leader and taught Mark well. He was a music major in high school and college, and received a degree from the US Navy School of Music in Little Creek Virginia.



Mark started playing on the Buffalo music scene at the age of 16 in various groups. In 1979 he toured with a band called The Colleagues, a great show band. In 1984 he accepted a gig as a staff guitarist at Walt Disney World Resort's EPCOT Center in Orlando, Florida. In the summer of 1985 he auditioned for, and was accepted into, the Navy School of Music in a guitarist position,



becoming one of five guitarists in the Navy at the time. He was stationed at the US naval air station in Memphis,Tennessee, during which time he was fortunate to perform with Charlton Heston, Whitney Houston and the Hager twins from the TV show Hee Haw.

Mark has performed in every state except Alaska and

Hawaii! In 1989 he returned to the Buffalo area playing in the local scene, currently playing with the Slim Chance band



and, of course, founding and leading Strike The Rock for over 25 years.


